INVESTING IN BERTRAND'S FUTURE

Recent work by Bertrand Area Community Fund is centered on developing connections between the community and the hearts and minds of the young people here.

Engaging with students through the support of Bertrand Community School is yielding fruit. Colby Gardine, a Bertrand alum, wrestling coach, and the youth engagement contact for BACF, is cultivating collaboration among BACF, businesses, and students on both group and individual levels.

A year ago, Bertrand High School was one of seven schools in the state to participate in the Nebraska Community Foundation's Youth Survey and a follow-up session for students to talk over opportunities they saw in the intersection of their own future with that of their hometown.

"The partnership with the BACF and Bertrand Community School has been both collaborative and productive," said Gardine. "The insight from the community youth is very valuable to our vision of the future Bertrand."

Eliciting the students' ideas revealed a wide, creative range of interests, with imaginative and substantial insights about Bertrand from retail and restaurants to infrastructure and housing.

"After doing the survey with our students, the BACF took that information and looked for ways to get our youth to come back to Bertrand," said BCS Superintendent Jason Brown. "They were looking for opportunities to serve and help businesses stay going or even start new business opportunities here in Bertrand."

Using the students' ideas as a jumping-off point, BACF applied for and received a Nebraska Community Foundation People Attraction Grant of \$10,000 and, with the required match of an additional \$10,000, launched the Hometown Career Mentorship

program to perhaps enable students to make some of these suggestions a reality.

"We had a planning meeting in February or March. We found that we wanted to have a career fair/mentoring opportunity for our juniors and seniors," said Brown. "We felt it was a good opportunity for our kids."

The mentor career fair April 14 at the school drew 20 Bertrand area businesses to talk about their industries and the opportunities for joining an established business or becoming an entrepreneur in the field.

BACF encouraged people to talk about their careers as they related to coming to or staying in Bertrand — how they started, education requirements, what niche they fill, their vision for the future of the career, and how other people and businesses helped them along the way.

"We had it set up so they had about 80 minutes. We did four rotations with the businesses and the students met with four of their choice," said Brown.

Nurturing students' vision of their future in a way that includes their own hometown can sometimes be as simple as explaining *Continues inside*...

that the option exists, or even providing that opportunity in the form of an internship or job shadow.

As a result of the Career Mentorship event, a student lined up a summer job shadow with a crop adjuster with Great Plains Crop Services in Bertrand. This initial sign of progress in the mentorship program is an encouraging sign that the fund is supporting an initiative that's both needed and wanted in the community.

"This was a great opportunity for our juniors and seniors to see what is available for job and career opportunities. They got great insight from all the businesses and employers that were there," said Brown. "I think this is a great way to get our students interested in a career field and back to the area one day to work and be successful."

Gardine agreed. "I am excited to see how partnerships like this will help accomplish dreams for a thriving Bertrand," he said.

OUR WORK AND IMPACT



JANUARY 2022: BACF hosted a celebration event for the Holthus Challenge Campaign. Kelly and Virginia Holthus challenged community members to raise \$300,000 to receive a \$150,000 match and increase BACF's unrestricted endowment by \$450,000. We exceeded our goal and doubled our endowment payout which will be used for high impact grantmaking in our community.



MARCH 2022: BACF facilitated a 2022 Nebraska Community Foundation Youth Survey for all Bertrand Community High School students. Bertrand was one of seven Greater Nebraska communities to participate in the online survey. (See sidebar for details) **APRIL 2022:** BACF made a \$500 grant to the Bertrand Lions Foundation for the Bertrand Easter Community Food Box Project.



MAY-AUGUST 2022: BACF granted \$1,000 in support of SCEDD, Inc. and the Bertrand Community Builders' efforts to conduct a local housing survey.



JUNE 2022: Bertrand Area Community Fund was proud to serve as a \$600 sponsor for the Bertrand Days Swimming Pool Games which raises funds for the Bertrand Aquatic Center.



OCTOBER 2022: BACF provided \$1,000 in support of the Bertrand Area Christmas Project for the Bertrand Holiday Food Box Project.



NOVEMBER 2022: Bertrand Area Community Fund participated in the 2022 Phelps County Give2Grow event hosted by the Phelps County Community Foundation. BACF raised over \$3,000 with an additional match of over \$1,000.

DECEMBER 2022: Bertrand Area Community Fund granted \$7,500 to the Bertrand Community School for East Gym technology which included a large screen and projector.

- \$3,924 granted to the Village of Bertrand for a video security system for Hi-Line Golf Course
- \$500 granted to the Young at Heart Senior Center for computer, software, and technology support



LISTENING TO LOCAL YOUTH

In the spring of 2022, Bertrand Area Community Fund sponsored a Nebraska Community Foundation Youth Survey of local high school students. Here are just a few of the findings from that survey:

- 86% of students are getting together at least a few times a year to do something positive for our community
- 71% say they are invited to share their opinions or get involved in town projects
- **80%** say they feel connected to the place they live
- Only **26%** say they play a role in this community
- Safety, good schools, and proximity to family are the most important factors of their ideal community
- **63%** report their ideal community is "small, like my hometown"
- 82% say there is no negative stigma with returning to/staying in your hometown

ADDRESSING A CRITICAL NEED



Bertrand Area Community Fund has been working on ways to address a critical local need—housing.

BACF first worked to convene a group of thoughtful community leaders and experts on the topic which led to the formation of a new LLC called Bertrand Community Builders, an organization focused on investing in the future of Bertrand—already 60–70 community members have stepped up to the task.

BACF was proud to provide support for a local housing study conducted by Bertrand Community Builders as well as funding for the village to complete a demolition project which will make space for new construction.

ABUNDANCE IN OUR HOMETOWNS

Phelps County's 10-year transfer of wealth is approximately \$720 million. Gosper County's is \$241 million. If 5% were captured to benefit our communities, that would be \$48 million to reinvest in the places we love.

We are experiencing the largest intergenerational transfer of wealth in Nebraska's history. Over the next 10 years, \$100 billion will transfer from one generation to the next. In 50 years, that number exceeds \$950 billion. The wealth may be held in real estate, securities, retirement accounts, life insurance, and other assets.

Some will go to taxes. Most will go to heirs. Due to outmigration, many of these heirs no longer live where they grew up and where the wealth was built and accumulated.

In 71 of Nebraska's 93 counties, including Phelps and Gosper, the wealth transfer will peak before 2045. There is real urgency to act now – the opportunity will never be greater.

To this end, Nebraska Community Foundation has created the Five to Thrive campaign. We are asking every generous Nebraskan to consider gifting just 5% of your estate to benefit your

hometown and/or your favorite charitable causes. This collective act could be a game changer for our hometowns. In Phelps and Gosper Counties, it would



result in over \$48 million over the next 10 years to be reinvested in education, health, prosperity, quality of life, and our community's ability to attract quality talent and young families..

REMEMBER:

Once wealth leaves the community, it is gone forever.

Once wealth is endowed in our community, it is here forever.
